#### **PURPOSE**

To seek Council approval for appointments of Council members to City Advisory Committees and Task Forces, and appointments of Council members to external committees and boards.

#### **SUMMARY**

This report recommends appointments of Council members to City Advisory Committees and Task Forces, and appointments of Council members to external committees and boards. The appointments to the Metro Vancouver Board of Directors will be considered in a separate motion.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Council annually appoints Council members to internal and external committees, task forces and commissions, as required by the Terms of Reference or bylaws for those bodies. Council members are normally appointed as the chair of those bodies.

Advisory Committees are struck under Section 142 of the Community Charter, and Task Forces are struck under Section 143 of the Charter. Both sections require Council approval for appointments.

In addition to the committees and task forces that align with Council's strategic plan, a number of regional and city-based external organizations have Council representation on their boards. It is the intent that the Council representative or liaison to those bodies represents the City's interest.

#### **DISCUSSION**

#### Internal Committees, Commissions, and Task Forces

The new Council has indicated a preference for certain committees to have more than one Council representative. In order to accommodate this, staff recommend changing the terms of reference for the Arts Advisory Committee and the Affordable Housing and Child Care Committee to allow for up to two members of Council to be appointed.

The membership for the Community Heritage Commission (CHC) is set out in Bylaw No. 6423, 1997, and will require a bylaw to amend the membership requirements to allow for up to two Council members to be appointed to the Commission. If Council directs staff to amend Bylaw No. 6423, 1997, staff will bring forward an amending bylaw for the November 28, 2022 meeting for three readings, followed by approval on December 12, 2022.

#### External Boards, Councils and Other Bodies

External boards, councils and other bodies welcome and include City representation on their governing entities. Council normally appointments members to these bodies for one-year terms.

#### **NEXT STEPS**

If Council approves the recommendation to change the Community Heritage Commission Bylaw, staff will bring forward an amendment bylaw at the November 28, 2022, Council meeting for three readings, with adoption anticipated on December 12.

Staff are in the process of public recruitment to Advisory Committees and will bring forward a report in January 2023, with public terms to start in February 2023.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

There are no financial implications as all activities recommended are part of the operating budget.
