1. CALL TO ORDER & LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Aftab Erfan, Facilitator, opened the meeting at 9:10 a.m., with quorum being reached at 9:25 a.m. A land acknowledgement was offered. Aftab then grounded the group through a breathing exercise. The Assembly was asked to recall the last meeting hosted in Queensborough where discussion centered on identity and community belonging.

2. OPENING AND OVERVIEW OF THE AGENDA

City of New Westminster staff introduced themselves. Regrets were offered on behalf of Jennifer Miller, Management of Public Engagement, and Nicole Armos, Co-Facilitator from SFU.

A. Erfan gave a summary of term limits, along with a reminder of the group's mandate. She informed the Assembly that the discussion from the June meeting around Climate Action will be provided to Council at their November 18, 2024 meeting. Further, the recommendations from the discussion on Cultural Observances will be presented to Council in December.

It was suggested that the topic for discussion for the current meeting could be the intergenerational model of the Assembly. A. Erfan asked for a show of support with a majority of members raising their hands. Members who did not support the topic were provided an opportunity to express their views.

3. FRAMING OUR DISCUSSION ON CULTURAL OBSERVANCES

The Assembly reviewed the notes regarding the discussion on Cultural Observances from the September 26 meeting. In giving feedback, Assembly members said:

- coming up with a process can be challenging if there is no clear purpose;
- timelines for observances are inconsistent;
- part of the reason for recognition is to bring the City together as a family;
 and that cities like Burnaby and Vancouver could be studied for the

festivals they offer;

- establishing community and belonging is a priority for the City; and that there are also budgetary considerations for events;
- cultural observances are a good way to learn about different cultures and traditions;
- Pride Week is an example of a cultural observance contributing positively to understanding and tolerance;
- it leads to validation and belonging and seeing yourself;
- the City could potentially put observances celebrated in the Active Living Guide; and
- there is potential for more global recognition in cultural observances, such as Black History Month and International Women's Day.

4. **GROUP ACTIVITY 1**

The first group activity was introduced as moving from aspirational to practical implementation. Three categories were described within the spectrum of effort, investment and level of engagement that comes with recognition:

- A. City-led. Larger scale, more investment.
- B. City-supported. Partnerships, medium scale effort.
- C. City-makes-visible. E.g. Lights, proclamation, small gestures, "acknowledgements".

It was acknowledged that these groups are not exclusive, and an example was given that there is some element of C in A and B.

The Assembly considered two examples, Multicultural Fair and Easter, and where they might fit in the above categories.

5 GROUP ACTIVITY 2

Assembly members were split into six groups and given a hypothetical sum of \$100 to allocate into the A, B and C categories from Group Activity 1.

A discussion followed as to why the groups split the funds the way that they did. The groups then gave further consideration of the three categories, A, B and C and the criteria and mechanisms for inclusion in each category.

6. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting ended at 12:34 p.m.
