**BE IT RESOLVED** that Council recognize limited staff capacity and human resource challenges by halting the establishment of a City Hall Community Art Exhibition Program; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that Council redirect the \$8,000 earmarked in the April 24, 2023 report titled "City Hall Community Art Exhibition

Program" to the City's Community Grant Program and make it available to local arts groups to support them displaying their work throughout our community.

Defeated.

Mayor Johnstone and Councillors Campbell, Henderson, McEvoy, and Nakagawa opposed.

In discussion, Council members noted:

- The Arts Advisory Committee and Arts Council collaborated on the space at the direction from Council;
- The installation will promote art in the community; and,
- The need for City Hall to be welcoming and inclusive for the community.

#### 10.1 Notices of Motion

# a. Inviting the Community to Celebrate and Say Goodbye to the Pattullo Bridge

### **Submitted by Councillor Fontaine**

**WHEREAS** the Pattullo Bridge is an iconic part of the City of New Westminster's history;

**WHEREAS** the historic Pattullo Bridge will be decommissioned and replaced by a wider, more modern bridge which will be operational in 2024; and.

**WHEREAS** the public should be provided with a unique opportunity to experience the Pattullo Bridge without truck and vehicle traffic.

**BE IT RESOLVED** that the Mayor write a letter on behalf of Council to the BC Ministry of Transportation to determine the feasibility of opening the Pattullo Bridge to pedestrian, cycle and other non-vehicular modes of transportation for a period of three days (Friday, Saturday, Sunday) subsequent to the opening of the new bridge; and.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that Council enter into discussions with the Ministry of Transportation to facilitate a community-based celebration of the existing Pattullo Bridge by way of an 'on bridge' day-long street festival during the three-day public access period.

# b. Updating and Determining the Effectiveness of the City's Tree Protection and Regulation Bylaw

### **Submitted by Councillor Minhas**

**WHEREAS** the City of New Westminster introduced a Tree Protection and Regulation Bylaw in 2016;

**WHEREAS** the overall tree canopy within the City of New Westminster has continued to decline since the introduction of the Tree Protection and Regulation bylaw;

**WHEREAS** it is important to regularly review bylaws for their effectiveness; and,

**WHEREAS** there is increasing evidence that trees and other greenspaces offer significant health and well-being benefits, including reduced deaths from cardiovascular disease and improved mental health outcomes.

**BE IT RESOLVED** that staff be directed to report back to Council regarding the costs, potential sources of funding and operational impacts pertaining to the City conducting an independent and armslength review and public consultation regarding the effectiveness of our Tree Protection and Regulation Bylaw.

### 11. NEW BUSINESS

### 11.1 2023 Summer Heat Response Update

In discussion, Council Members noted:

 The need for the public to be informed about procedures prior to a heat event;

- Suggestion that regulatory changes be implemented in advance of a heat event; and,
- Suggestion that staff explore regulatory changes to require a heat emergency plan for buildings.

Brad Davies, Acting Deputy Chief, New Westminster Fire and Rescue Services, noted:

- High risk buildings will be identified for the air conditioner loan program;
- A communication plan is in place to notify residents regarding a heat event; and,
- Additional spray parks and misters will be initiated in advance of the heat event

#### MOVED and SECONDED

**THAT** Council direct staff to explore what regulatory and policy tools are available to regulate heat plans.

Carried.

All members present voted in favour of the motion.
