Reached 123 people



 - Tenants Union




What we did: Engagement Process

A variety of methods were used to let community members know about the opportunity to share their input.


Notices about the engagement were posted in/on the following locations:


How do you think the City should balance its budget?

What we heard: Targeted Workshops


- Desire for City spending to support vulnerable community members: seniors, children and youth, low-income residents, tenants, and those experiencing homelessness
- Ideas to increase revenue: increasing bylaw fines/enforcement; improve amenities/programs to increase participation and admission revenue; attract investment
- Concerns about % spent on policing; suggestions to redirect some of that money to social supports
- Priorities for allocating "unexpected" funds: housing, tenant supports/protection, maintenance and repairs, programs for cooling, protecting the environment, creating more jobs, saving some

How would you rank the value you receive for your tax dollars?


76% rate value as average or better

Sidewalk repairs, new sidewalks and expanding pedestrian areas	2.8	1	
Road repairs and paving	3.77	2	
Public realm improvements (such as sidewalks, lighting, seating, etc.) in major pedestrian areas such as Sixth Street and Sixth Avenue in Uptown	4.28	3	
Building new sustainable transportation routes (cycling, wheeling, walking) and improving existing greenways	4.59	4	
Street lighting renewal and improvement	5.04	5	
Adding new bus shelters and benches at bus stops	5.54	6	
Traffic signal replacements and adjustments	5.65	7

What we heard: Survey Capital projects ranked No. 1

Capital Project Category	Project Type Ranked #1 (most important)
Transportation	Sidewalk repairs, new sidewalks and expanding pedestrian areas
Parks Improvement	Tree planting in parks, public lands and city boulevards
Facilities and Amenities	Repairs and upgrades to existing civic buildings and facilities
Utilities	Sewer separation work
Climate Action-Related	Building retrofit and heat pump incentive programs for property owners

Generally, when the City receives unexpected funding, how would you prefer we allocate it?




Put the money directly towards keeping tax and utility rates as low as possible
