1. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Johnstone called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m.

Mayor Johnstone recognized with respect that New Westminster is on the unceded and unsurrendered land of the Halkomelem speaking peoples. He acknowledged that colonialism has made invisible their histories and connections to the land. He recognized that, as a City, we are learning and building relationships with the people whose lands we are on.

2. MOTION TO DESIGNATE ACTING MAYOR AS CHAIR

THAT Acting Mayor Campbell be appointed chair of the meeting.

4.1 Budget 2024: Engineering and Electrical Utility Amendment Bylaw Report (Circulated Separately)

THAT Council give three readings to the attached Engineering User Fees and Rates Amendment Bylaw No. 8440, 2023 in the Bylaws section of the agenda; and

THAT Council give three readings to the attached Electrical Utility Amendment Bylaw No. 8441, 2023 in the Bylaws section of the agenda.

4.2 Budget 2024: Additional Information Stemming from Council's Questions at the November 20th Budget Workshop (Circulated Separately)

Discussion ensued on:

- The City is responding to residents' desire for additional services, resulting in the proposed budget enhancement requests;
- Mayor's Office will include intergovernmental relations, and will come forward separated at the December 11 budget report;
- Council to receive expenditures for year-end Q3 at the Council meeting of December 11, 2023, however, individually itemized expenditures undertaken for the past year not available; and
- Staff advised the calculation of hiring each full time (FTE) position includes the budgeted salary but also benefits and other costs such as provisioning of office equipment. Staff approximated non-salary benefits is 26% on top of the posted FTE salary and 12% for auxiliary staff.

MOVED and SECONDED

THAT Council receive the analyses from the accompanying memos as part of the 2024 Budget deliberation process.

5.2 Electrical Utility Amendment Bylaw No. 8441, 2023 (Circulated Separately)

Procedural Note: An amendment to the bylaw was proposed.

MOVED and SECONDED

THAT Electrical Utility Amendment Bylaw No. 8441, 2023 be amended to remove mention of a climate action levy of 3.5%.

Procedural Note: Discussed ensued regarding the proposed amendment.

Discussion ensued on:

- The Climate Action Levy, introduced in 2020 as part of a rate rider, results in \$2 million in funding, in addition to \$3.5 million funding received via carbon credits, which could be put toward the electrical utility's infrastructure;
- Local governments need to have tools such as the levy, a small level of ongoing funds to promote and move forward the work of various green energy, and climate change initiatives; and
- Staff indicated a future report detailing the potential case for a multi-tiered approach to utility metering in the City.

Procedural Note: The question on the proposed amendment was called.

MOVED and SECONDED

THAT Electrical Utility Amendment Bylaw No. 8441, 2023 be amended to remove mention of a Climate Action Levy of 3.5%.

Defeated

Opposed by Mayor Johnstone, Acting Mayor Campbell and Councillors McEvoy and Nakagawa.

- Council noted that historically cities did not do such environmental work, but residents generally support the climate levy and climate action in general; and
- The City has not yet spent the funds that have been accumulating from the levy and carbon credit sales.

THAT Electrical Utility Amendment Bylaw No. 8441, 2023 be amended to remove references to a Climate Action Levy of 3.5% in the billed amounts to apply.

Opposed by Mayor Johnstone, Acting Mayor Campbell and Councillors
