### Introduction

For several years, the City of New Westminster has offered civic grants to community groups to support their efforts to bring liveliness to the community and services to local residents. Annually, the City gives out approximately \$975,000 in grants, which includes both cash awards and in-kind awards of City services that have a cost attached to them, such as street closures, rental space in City facilities, permits, etc.

Each community group can submit only one application per grant intake, covering all their funding requests. Applications are submitted online and reviewed by one of three committees made up of community members. The City's Grants Policy details the process, and the Grants Criteria are updated annually to specify eligibility. Priority is usually given to New Westminster-based organizations, but impactful applications from outside the area are considered. Due to limited funding, not all requests are approved. To continue adapting and responding to the community's needs in a post-pandemic world, the City is considering some refinements to the grants program. The criteria, process, and administration of the civic grant program are being reviewed to continue supporting the community while also aligning with the City's Strategic Priorities Plan.

Community members and grant applicants were asked to provide feedback to help shape the refinements planned. This report provides a summary and results from the community engagement.

## Engagement Process

The Civic Grants Program Engagement process started in April 2024 with an online survey launched on [Be Heard New West](#), followed by a focus group conversation with representatives from community groups that have applied for and/or received grants from the City. City staff also connected one-on-one with other representatives from grant-receiving organizations.

## What We Heard

### Focus Group

#### **Focus Group Background & Format**

City grant applicants and recipients were invited to participate in virtual focus groups to share their experiences with the grants program and discuss potential ideas for improvements. Two focus group sessions were initially scheduled, but one was cancelled due to low registration. A virtual session was held on May 22, 2024, with four participants. An additional two grant recipients spoke with staff one-on-one and answered the same questions posed in the focus group.

#### **What We Heard: Key Themes**

Focus group participants were asked three questions:

- What is working well with the City's grants program?
- What are the pain points with the current system of grants?
- What ideas and suggestions do you have to improve the process?

The following feedback was shared by participants in the focus group and one-on-one conversations:

- Idea to evaluate grant applications using a values-based matrix, rather than Council priorities, to remove any potential political component
- Desire for City grants staff to take more time to learn about grant applicants' projects / programs, and build relationships
- Build in flexibility to meet the unique needs of service partners, with different approach for festivals / events / one-off programs
- Preference for unrestricted funding: grant recipient should be able to direct funds where they are most needed rather than only certain items
- Preference for a single point of contact / City staff member to work with on grants
- Support for longer grant terms for partnerships (i.e. multi-year funding)
- Idea for community partners to manage a micro granting program on the City's behalf

### Online Survey

A survey was available on Be Heard New West from April 15 – May 6, 2024. The survey included questions for New Westminster residents, as well as those who represent community groups that may be eligible to apply for City grants.

Questions for community members focused on how they think the City should prioritize grant requests, and the overall grants budget. Questions for those who represent a

community group covered topics related to the application process, grant criteria, and reporting requirements.

Details from each section of the survey are shared below along with a summary of the results from each question. Background information was provided throughout the survey and is also included below.

### **Section 1: Grant Prioritization**

This section of the survey asked about how the City should prioritize grant applications, as the program receives requests for significantly more funds than are available.

Currently, the City distributes a total of about \$975,000 in grants to community groups each year. The current process is that grant applications are accepted through an online portal for about a month in the fall, and are then considered by one of three grant committees. Each grant committee is composed of residents, at least one staff member, and individuals appointed because of their special focus area. The committees evaluate the applications and when they agree, they make recommendations to the Chief Administrative Officer who gives final approval.

One of the changes we are considering is having one committee review all applications and decide which will receive funding. Streamlining these committees into one committee rather than three would help committee members see the bigger picture of the applications as a whole, rather than only by portfolio, and would provide greater flexibility for applications that may fall into more than one category.

Mayor and Council do not have decision-making power on what organizations receive grant funding; however Council's Strategic Priorities Plan is used as a guide for the committees to evaluate grant applications. Applicants are asked to describe how their proposed project or event aligns with the Strategic Priorities. Applications that align more closely with the Strategic Priorities are given more weight in the committee's decision-making process.

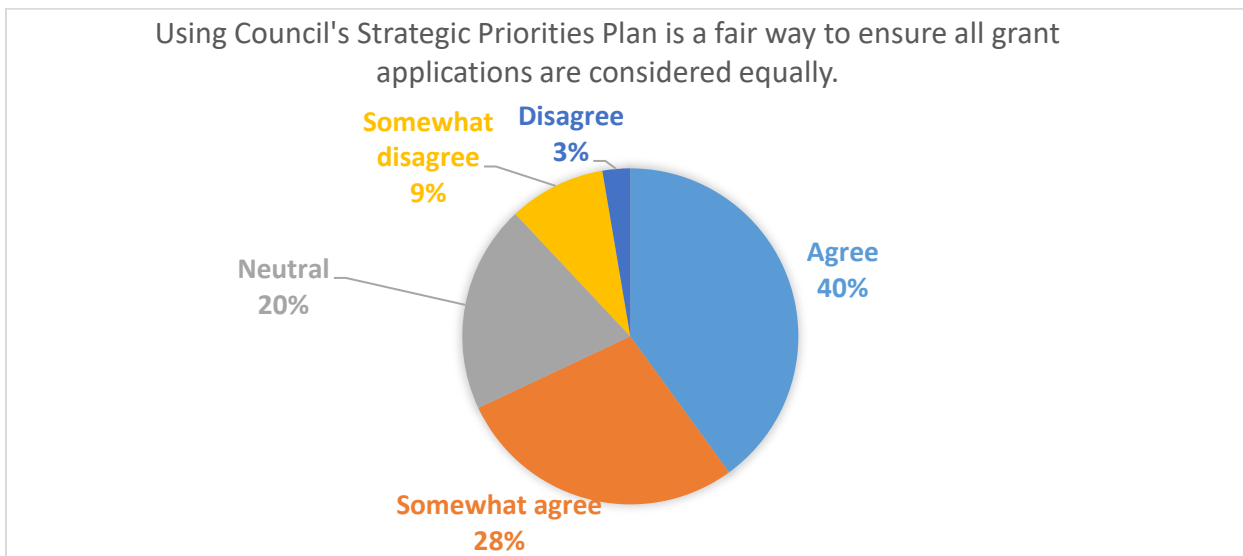

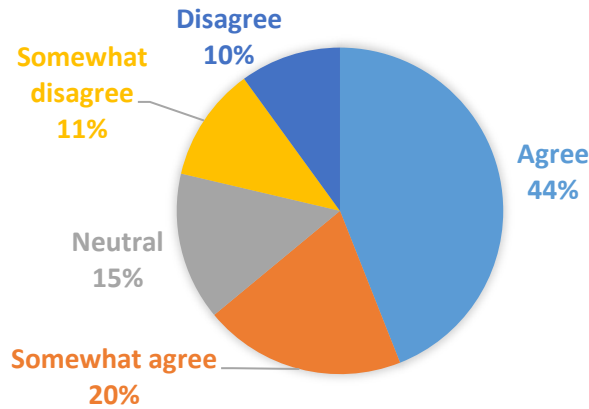

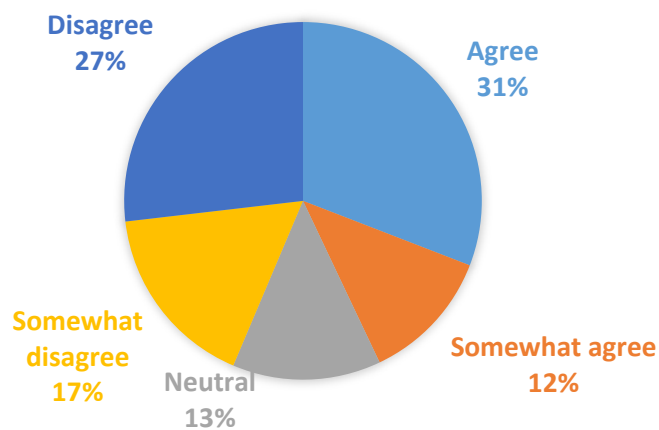

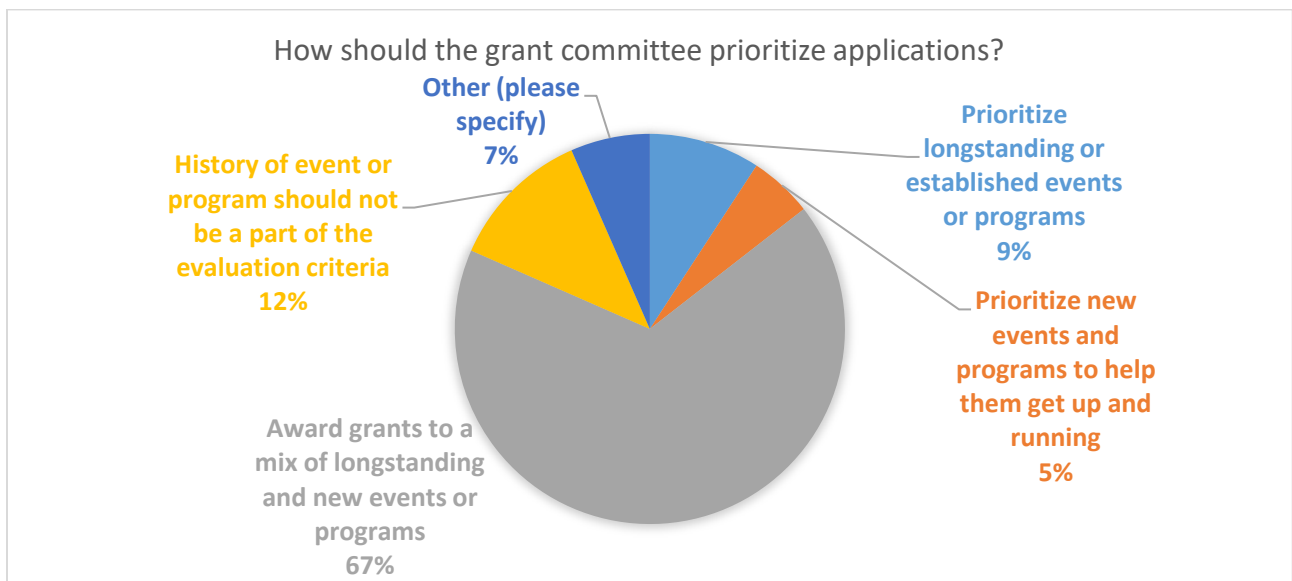

**A total of 10 comments were provided by those who chose “other, please specify.”**

The comments included:

- "I can barely afford my property taxes and we are giving away free money. Basically property owners are finding all this while renters benefit from our hard work"
- "We are living in QUEENSBOROUGH who pays lot of property tax, but always got neglected. We are hoping to use some grant to make our community more beautiful, like put some flowers, more family activities, build a bigger library, etc..."
- "History of event or program shouldn't be high priority. More importantly would be the area of interest, need/value/benefit of the program to the community."
- "Impact"

- “Prioritize applications that will create the biggest impact to the community, i.e. put resources where they are needed most, such as the climate crisis”
- “Grant set aside for city small street garbage clean up education to not litter. What happened to supernatural b.c. ?”
- “Mix longstanding and new events or programs and consider stats of how many will benefit, and the benefit to the City of New Westminster plus tourism, visitation and public relations.”
- “Annual assessments should be done on longstanding programs to evaluate if they are still doing well and should they continue to be supported? I agree that awarding grants to a mix of longstanding and new events is fair”
- “Prioritize longstanding event and community economic development initiatives”
- “Award grants to organizations/events that create opportunities for the City to realize its vision of the community it wants to be, not because an organization has "always received a grant". For example, funding should not be provided for "May Day" - it is a colonial anachronism that runs counter to the values of creating an inclusive community.”

## Section 2: Multi-Year Funding

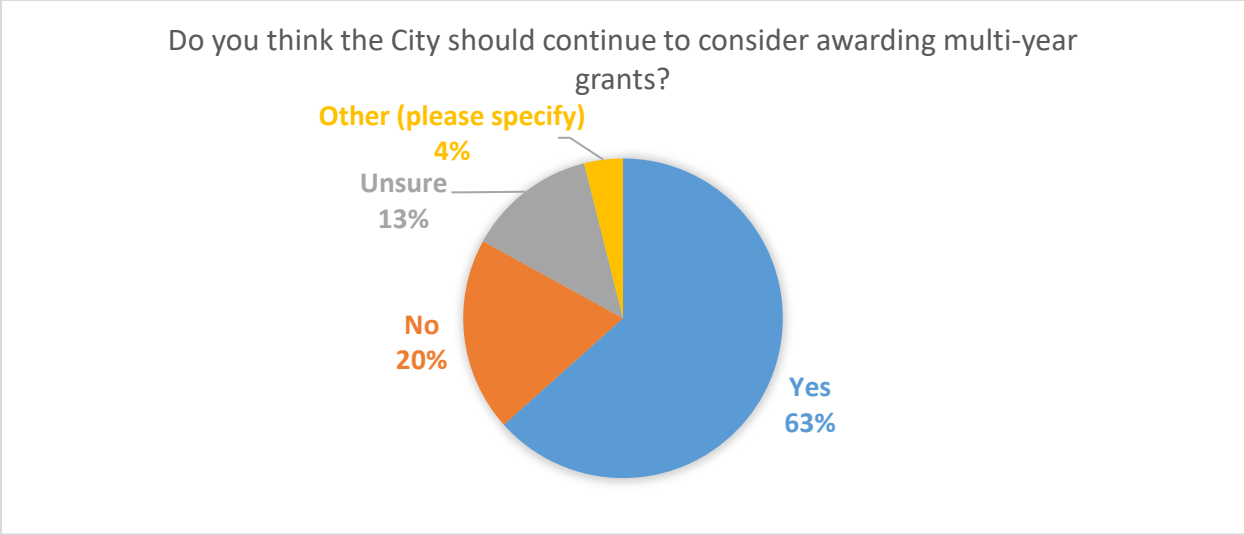
Currently, grant applicants may request “multi-year funding” through a single grant application, which, if they are successful, secures them funding for up to three years at the same amount each year. This provides organizations with guaranteed funding for more than one year; however, it also means that they can't apply for additional grants when they are receiving this multi-year funding. Another benefit is that multi-year grant recipients receive their annual funding upfront, while one-time grant recipients must apply for reimbursement after their event or program.

The grant committees take requests for multi-year funding into consideration, and may award them if the rationale is agreed to by the committee, but the committee can decide that the applicant only be awarded a single year of funding. Awarding multi-year grants has impacts on the grant budget for the future, as it means those multi-year funds are pre-allocated for future years. This reduces the overall amount that other applicants can draw from in the following year.

**A total of 6 comments were provided by those who chose “other, please specify.”** The comments included:

- “I believe that there is likely many grey area situations that would require special judgement. I do not believe that this should be a yes or no process. Perhaps they need to meet some certain criteria for consideration?”
- “Yes , if beautification , cleaning up are the reason.”
- “It seems there are long standing events that get funded consistently. The city might want to consider allocating funds directly from the budget without going through a grant award process which adds significant overhead for both parties. Report submission requirements would remain, and provide the opportunity for the city to evaluate whether this funding is justified YoY.”
- “As above, yes I agree that the City should continue to consider some multi-year grants, but assess them after their term runs out - it gives some groups stability to know they have support for a few years but doesn't mean it should continue forever”
- “Yes because, to me, a multi-year event signifies a longer-term vision and good planning. BUT, I suggest that the award of subsequent funding be contingent on how well they executed their plan in their preceding year.”
- “yes, but have a cap on the total available for multi-year grants”

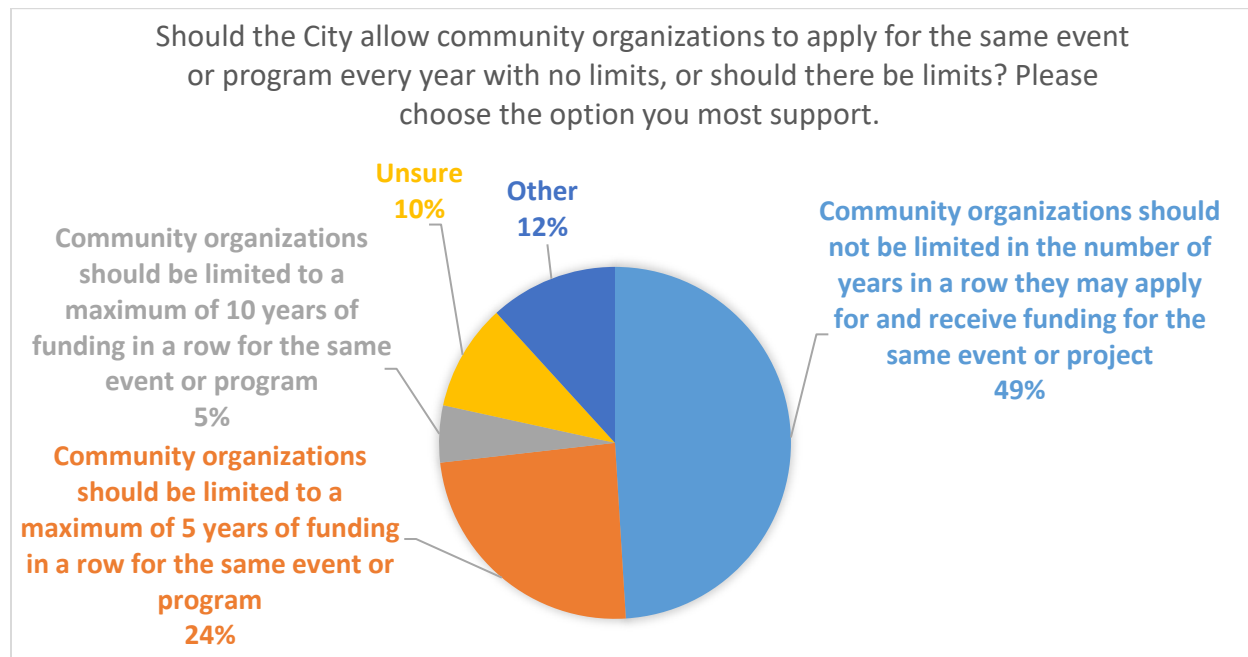
**Section 3: Limits to Number of Years in a Row**

Currently, community organizations may apply every year for a grant and there are no limits to the number of years in a row that they may be awarded funding for the same program or event. We have heard suggestions that community groups should be limited in the number of years in a row they are able to receive a grant for the same event or program, to make it fairer to new programs or applicants.

## Question 7

A total of 63 participants provided a response to this question. Below are the key themes and examples of responses provided. In some cases, one person’s response may have included multiple themes. Themes with five or more mentions are listed below.

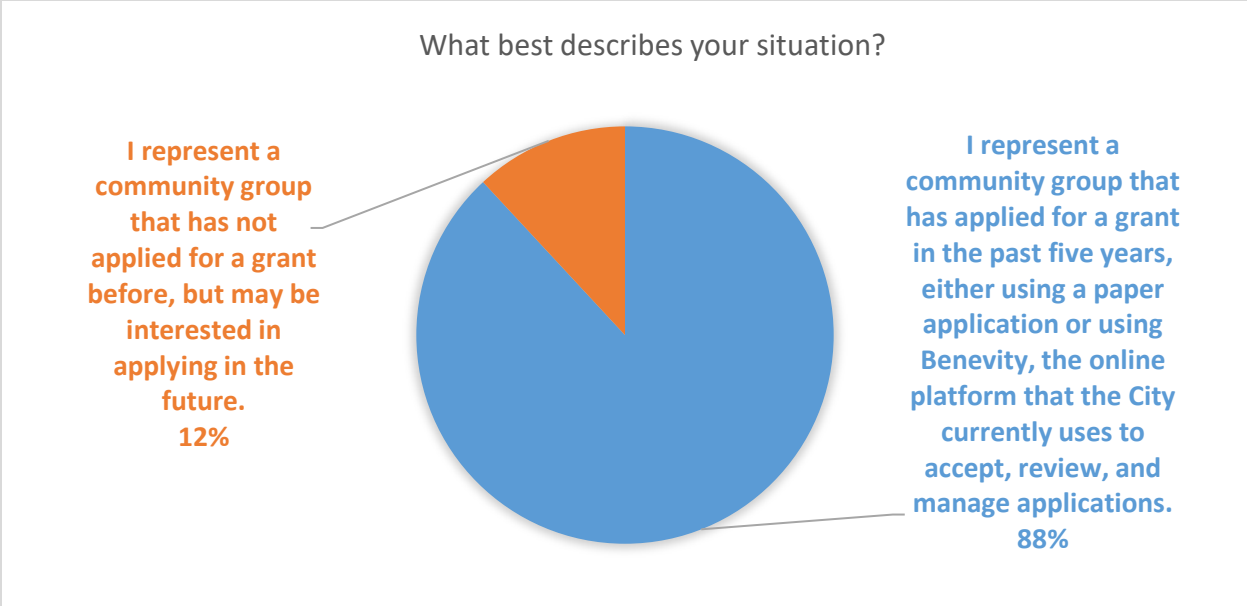

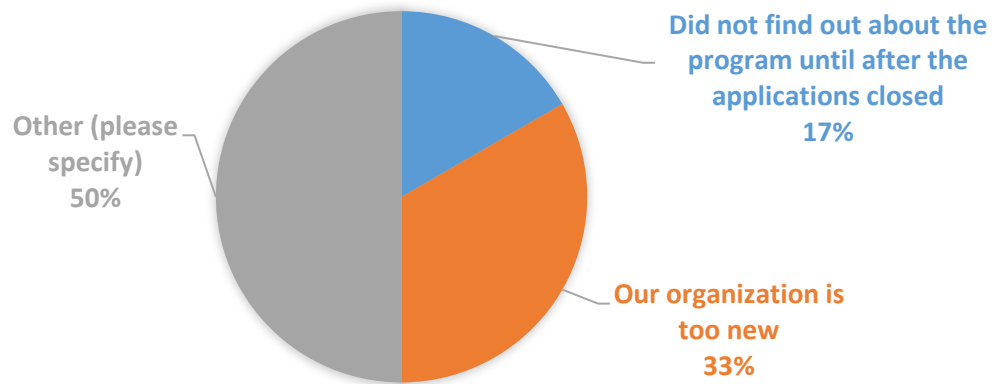

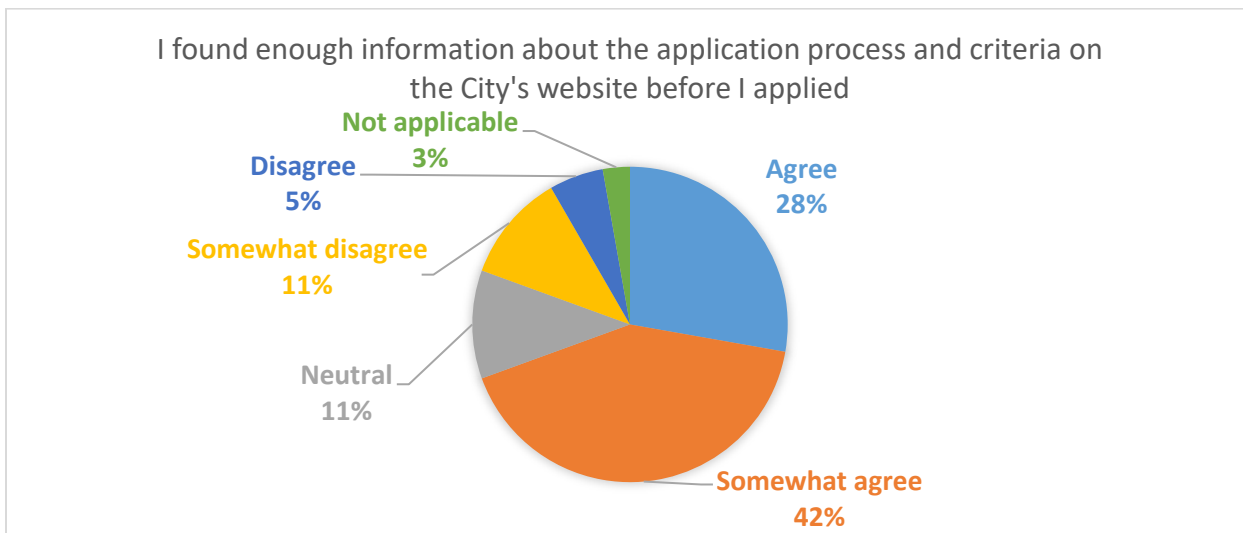

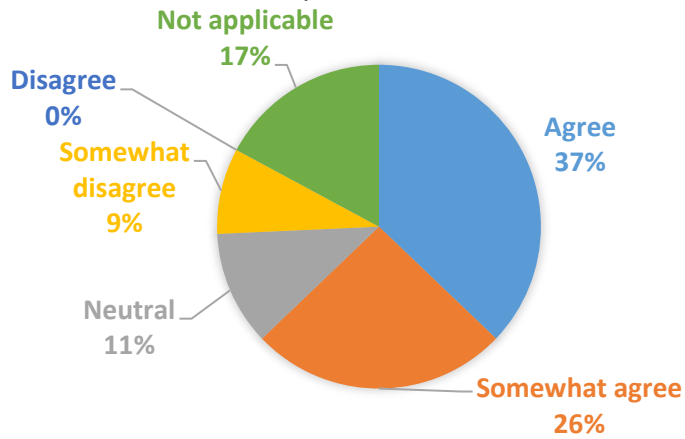

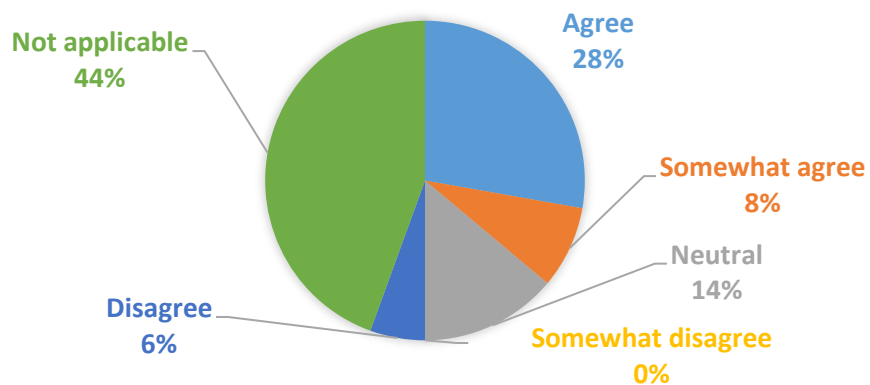

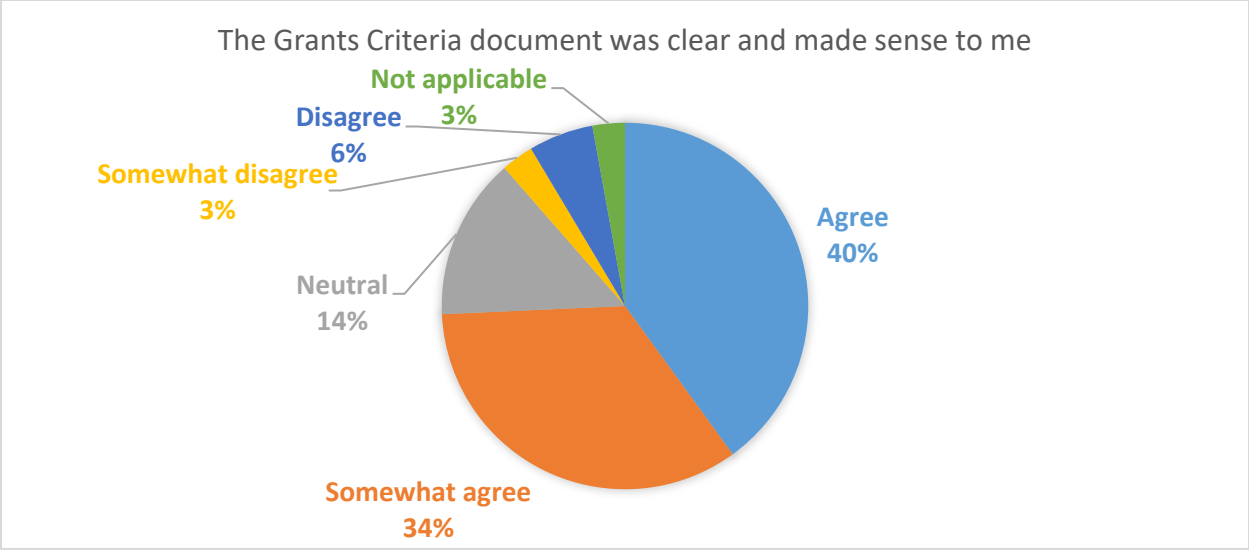

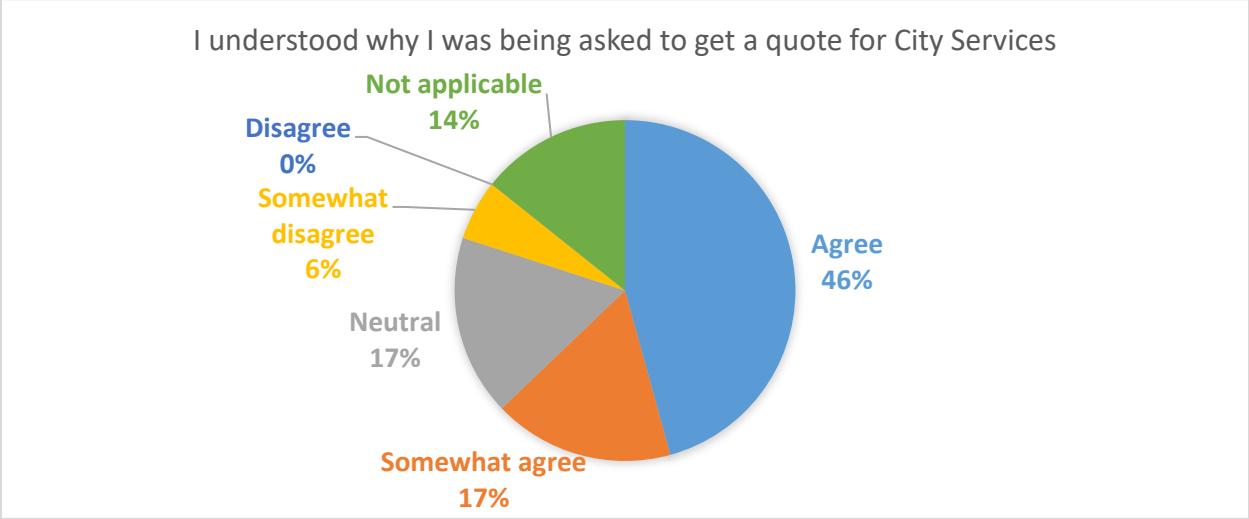

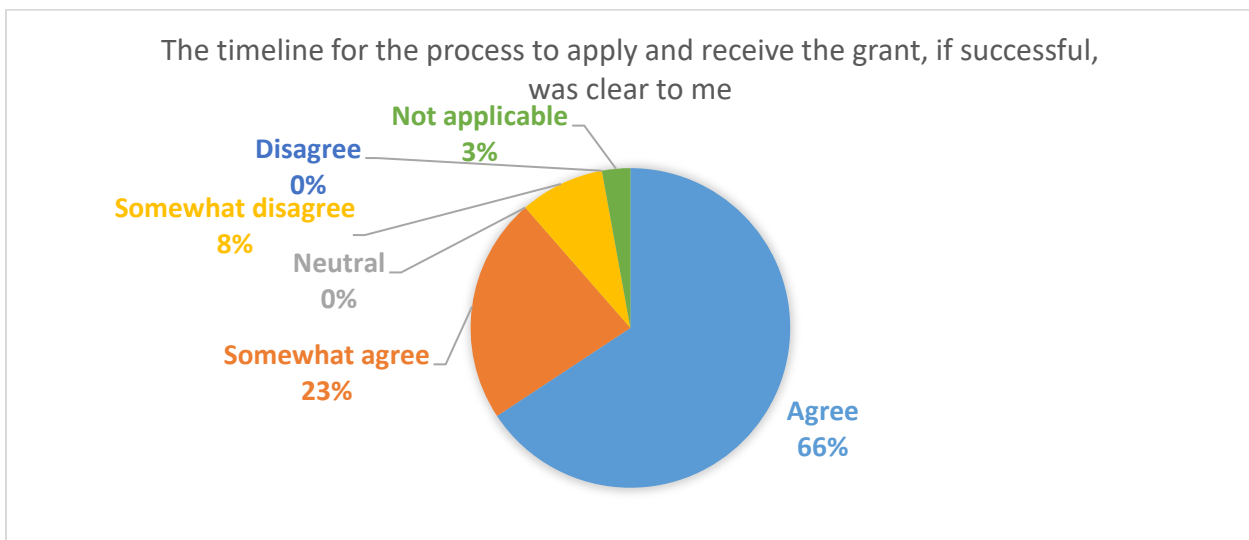

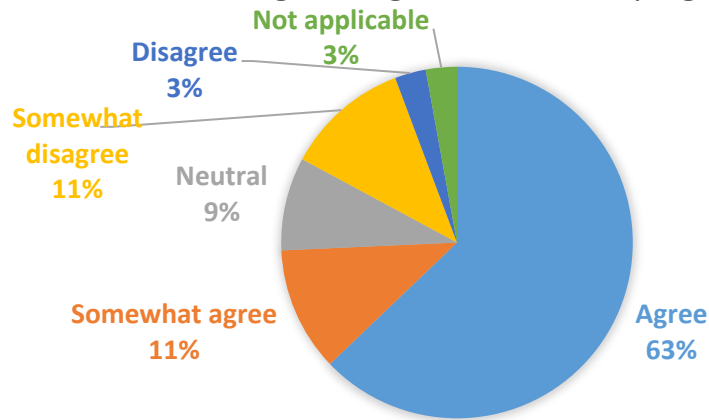

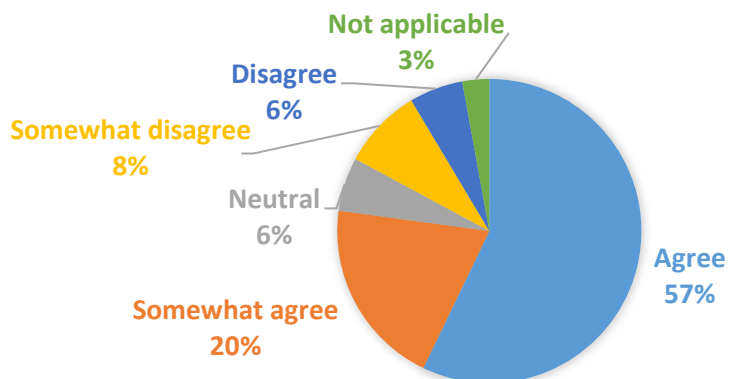

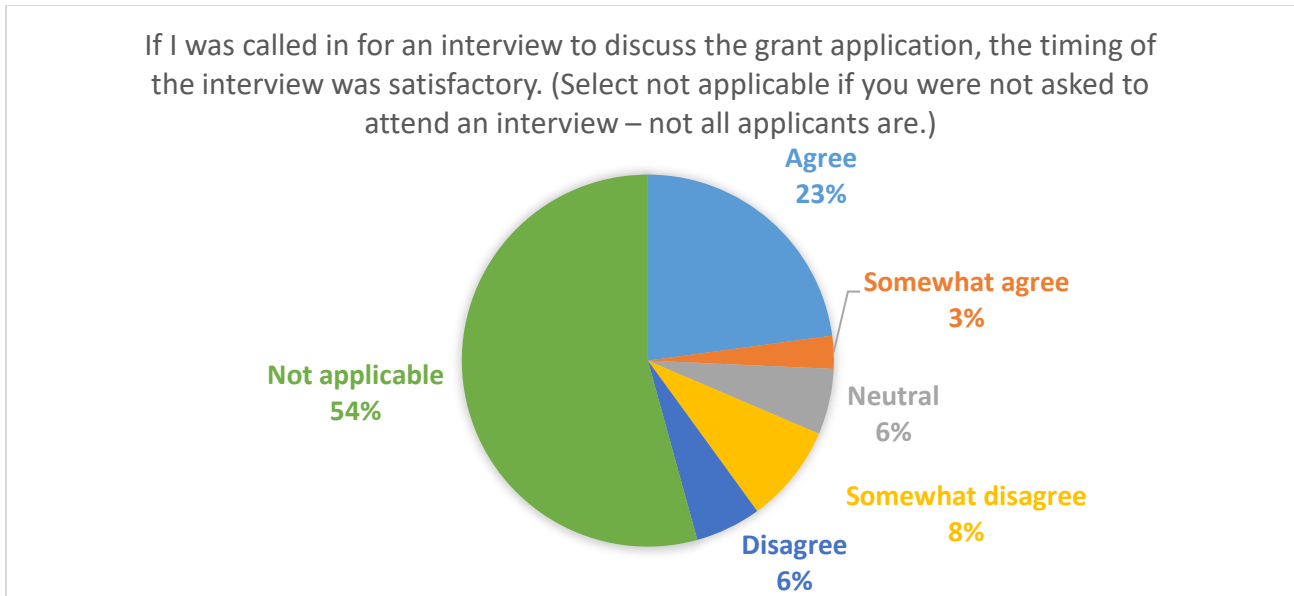

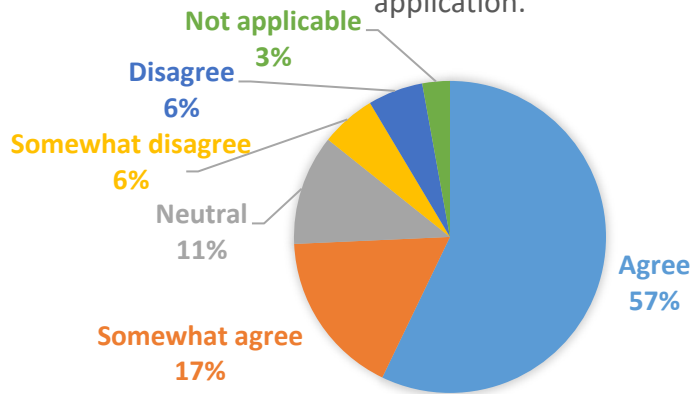

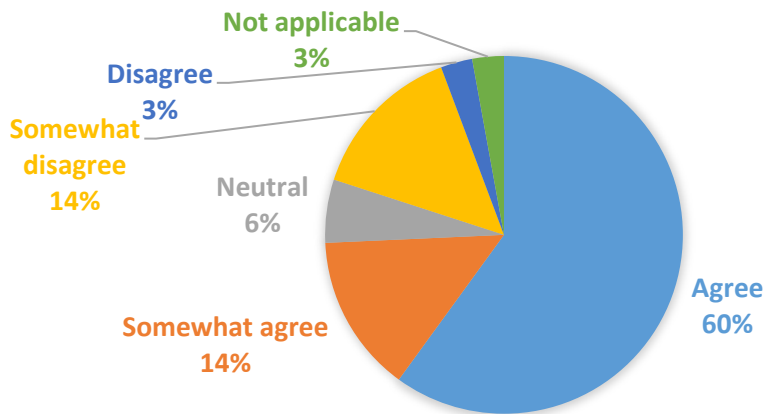

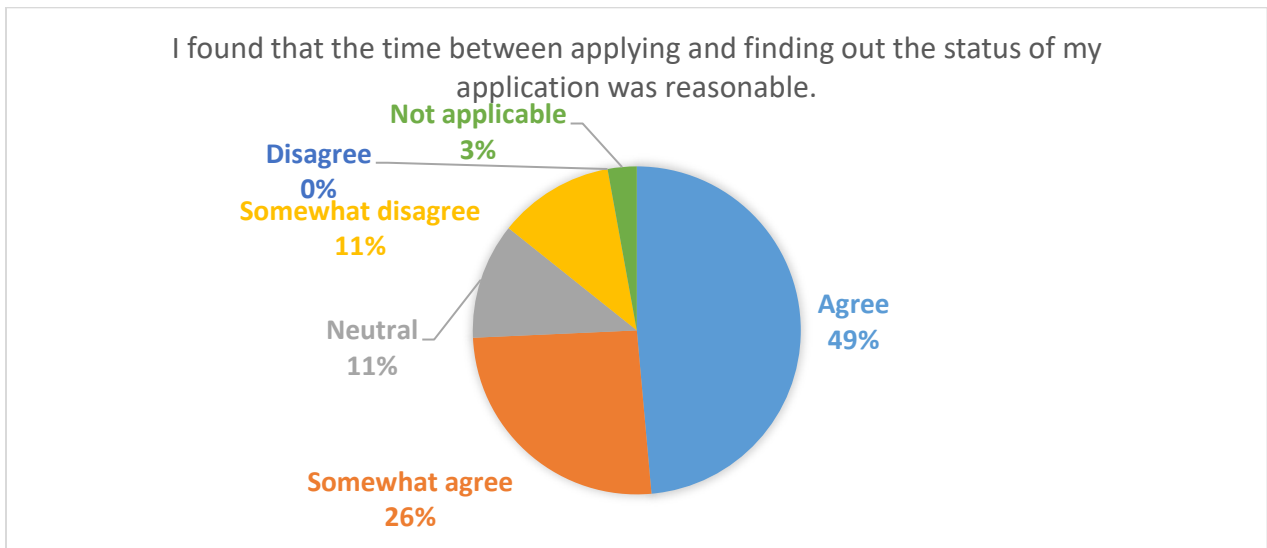

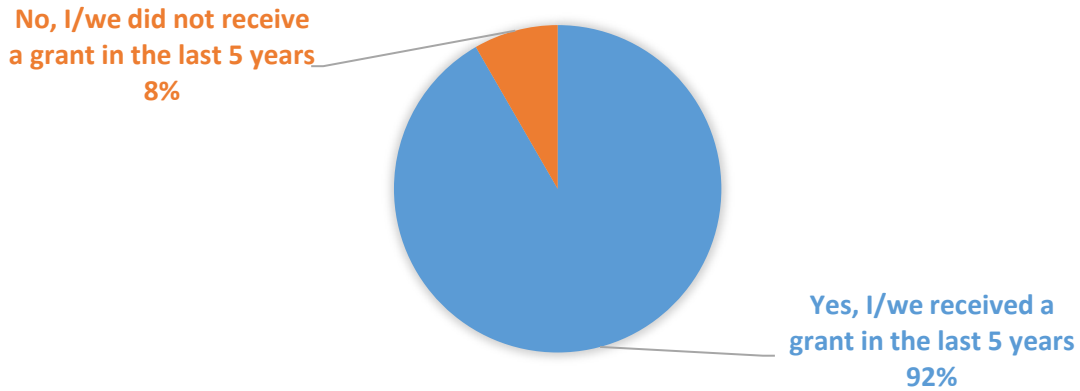

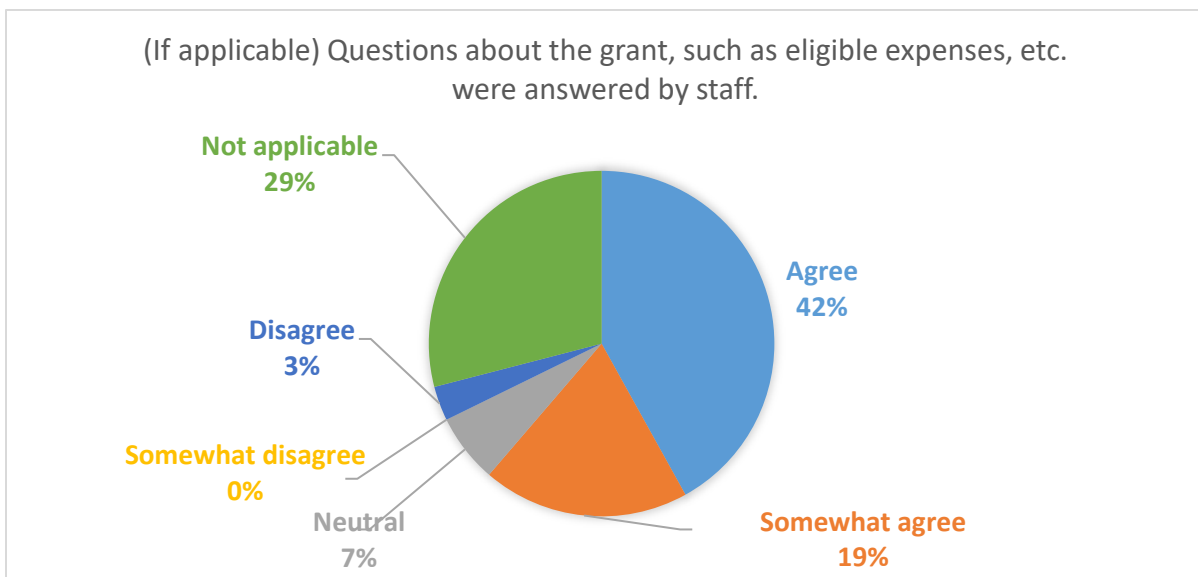

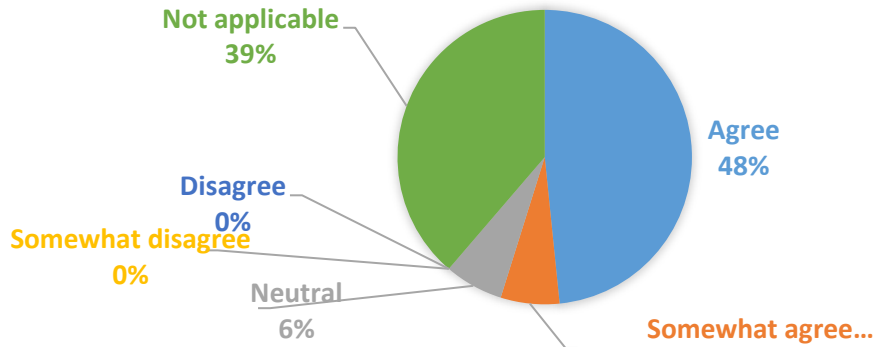

## Section 8: Reporting

This section asked about the grantees' experience reporting back to the City.

The City currently asks both multi-year and single year grant recipients to provide a variety of reports to share the outcomes of their project. The required reports are described below. These reports must be submitted on or before December 1 of the year the grant was awarded. Not providing the required reports means that an organization will not be considered for a future grant.

- All grant recipients fill out the [Snapshot of Success](#), which is used to report back to Mayor and Council on the achievements that the civic grant program helped fund.
- Grant recipients that received money for an event fill out the [Post Event Evaluation Form](#). This is also the form that they need to submit to be reimbursed for their expenses.
- Grant recipients that received money for a project fill out the [Post Project Evaluation Form](#). This is also the form that they need to submit to be reimbursed for their expenses.
- Multi-year grant recipients affirm their commitment to use the funds as outlined in their application by filling out the [Statement of Accountability](#), which includes budget details and reporting on the evaluation of the event or program.

The City has heard feedback that the reporting requirements are confusing and too extensive. Changes to the reporting will be required if there are any changes made to the criteria or administrative process. Regardless, the City wants to simplify the reporting to focus on outcomes and strategic priority alignment, and to ensure that community groups are only required to fill out one report regardless of whether they received cash or in-kind services.

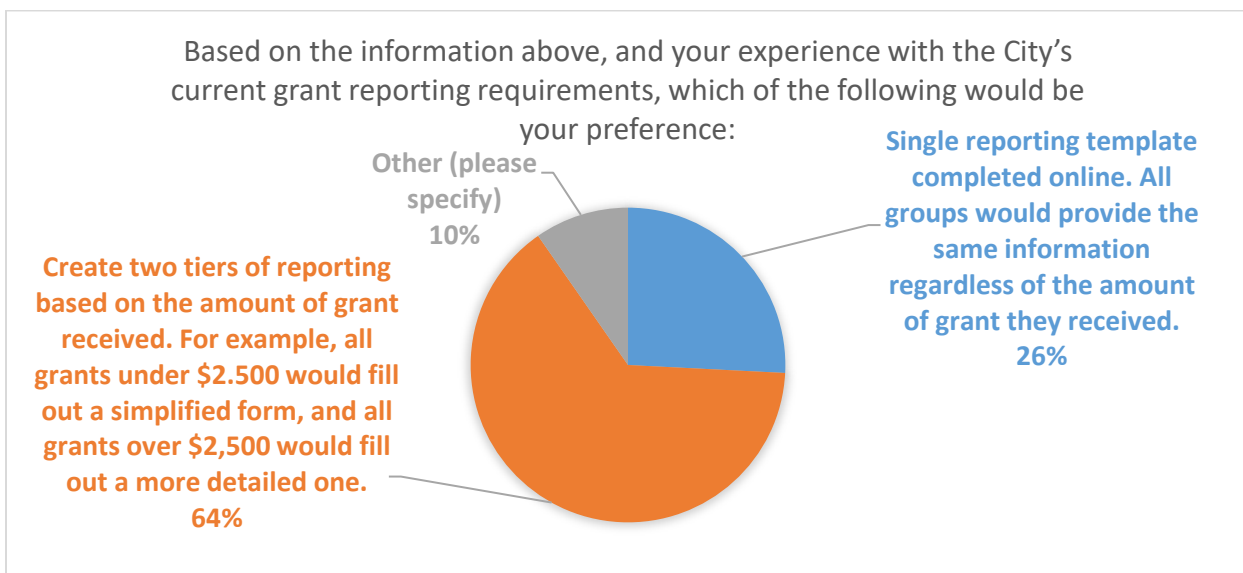
One option may be to move to a single reporting template that is completed online. The benefit is that it would be easier for many community groups to fulfill their requirements, but the drawback is that the City may get less specific information about the impacts of individual grants if the questions are the same for all types of grant recipients.

Another option may be to have two tiers of reports, where grants over a certain dollar value are required to fill out a more detailed report and those under the amount may fill out a simpler version.

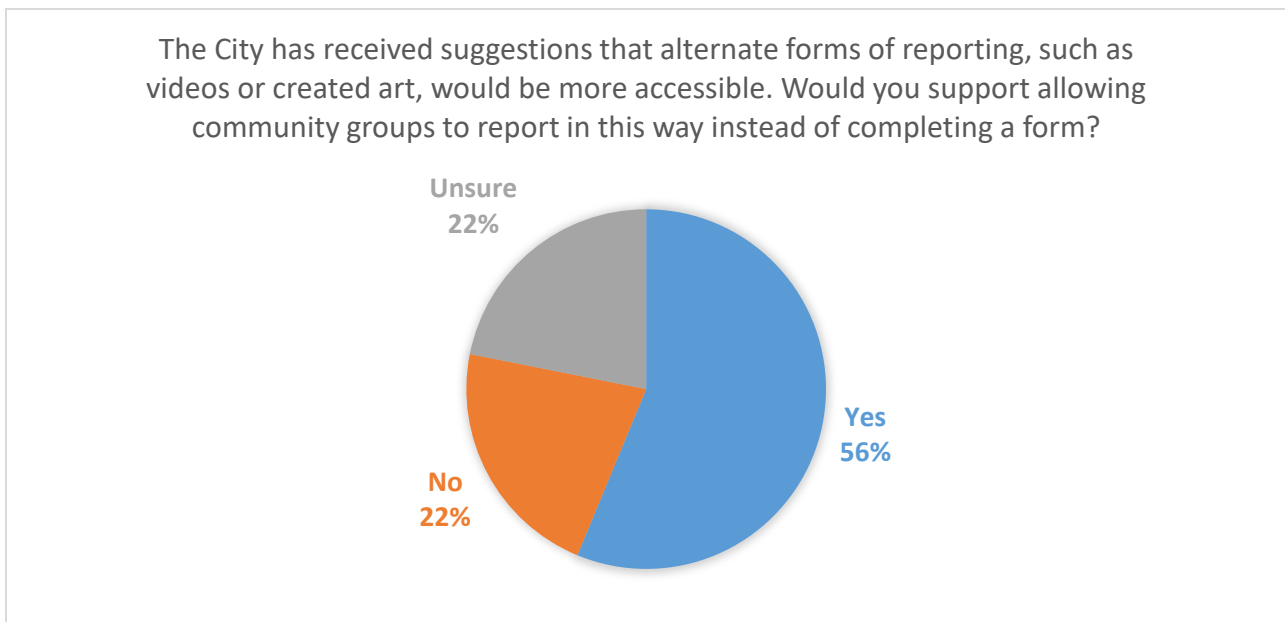

*A total of 13 participants opted to answer this question. Below are the responses they provided.*

- "Online or fillable pdf forms that work correctly would be appreciated. Scrutinize better the policing needs and corresponding costs - the cost of police services at events is exorbitant. Could security be hired for some policing roles instead of

staffing all with police? Large events are not given a choice with no discussion about alternatives to very large police presence.”

- “Outwardly, a program may seem successful - however, it may not represent the overall health of the organization that ran it. For multi-year grants, I think it's really important that the strength of an organization be weighed, alongside the benefits their programs may bring to the community.”
- “After all the effort planning an event or project, the report back should be less prescriptive, receipts and proof the event or project took place should be sufficient.”
- “Advise the grant recipient that there must be a final reporting and provide the final reporting form to them when you give them their money. Offer support if they feel they need it. If a group cannot fill out a simple reporting form, it is highly unlikely they can handle the grant money effectively. Perhaps recruit some 'mentors' - local folks who would help an inexperienced group navigate the whole process.”
- “I think having a variety of reporting options could be a possibility. We have many newcomer participants that do not want to be photographed or video-graphed due to confidentiality.”
- “Making grants more accessible makes sense. Moving to trust based grants allows charities to focus on their work in the community. “
- “We have received a small event grant and the report we had to submit with our receipts was 60+ pages but not when we submit for our much larger partnership grant - it makes us not apply for the smaller, more nimble grants that we should apply for when small opportunities come up. I would also LOVE to see a strategy for sharing about things that are coming up that are grant awards AND seeing the reports in whatever cool format they come in... scrapbooks! Quilts! Music videos!”
- “I would suggest a portal where we could upload receipts and track grant spending for our organization”
- “Our organization has received the grant before but I am new employee so this year will be the first time I will do the reporting, I have asked more detailed guidance by email but have not received answer to my questions.”
- “Alternative forms of reporting must still provide specifics required by the current form of reporting.”
- "1) No printing/reporting capability in Benevity while the application is being worked on. This leaves the applicant to copy text fields into a word document.  
2) Benevity Application Form uses 1 line long text fields for some paragraphs.  
3) The grant application and budget that is submitted is never updated to reflect the



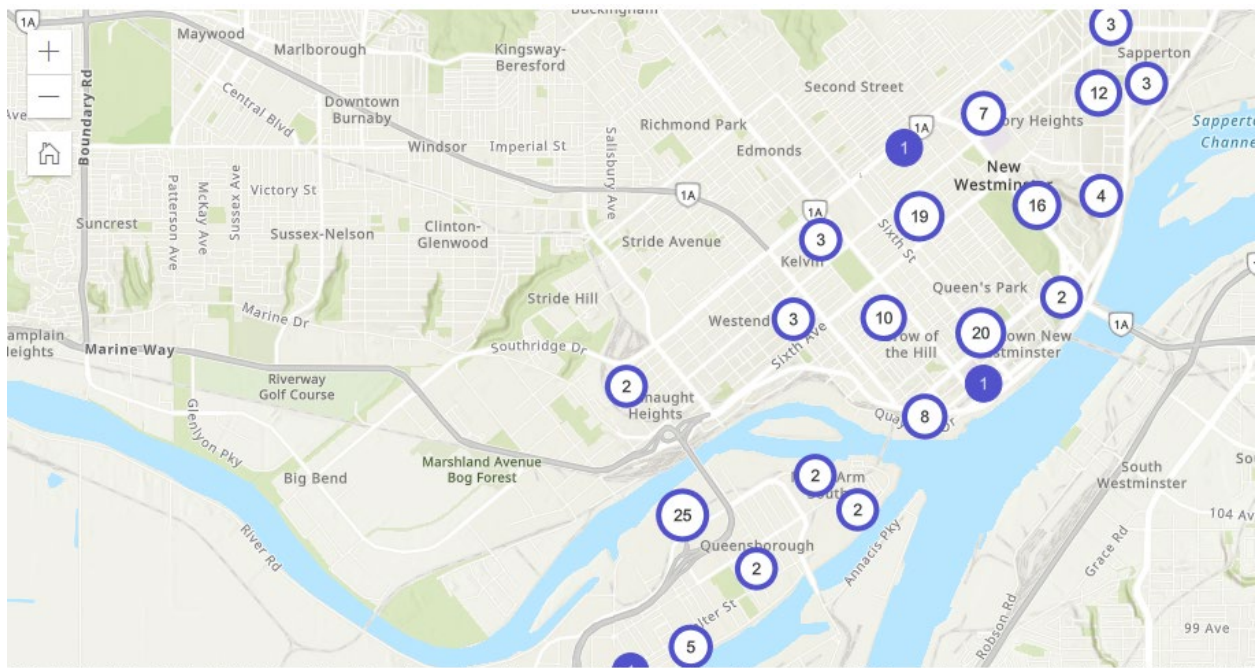
end result of the budget review. This causes problems when someone new takes over the next year."

- "I agree the reporting process is a little confusing. Creating an online platform to clearly layout the timelines, deadlines and reports to be completed would be super helpful! Again, the budget template for single-year grants is a little like fitting a spare peg in a round hole for larger scale events."
- "I would like to be included in the upcoming focus group which has been mentioned."

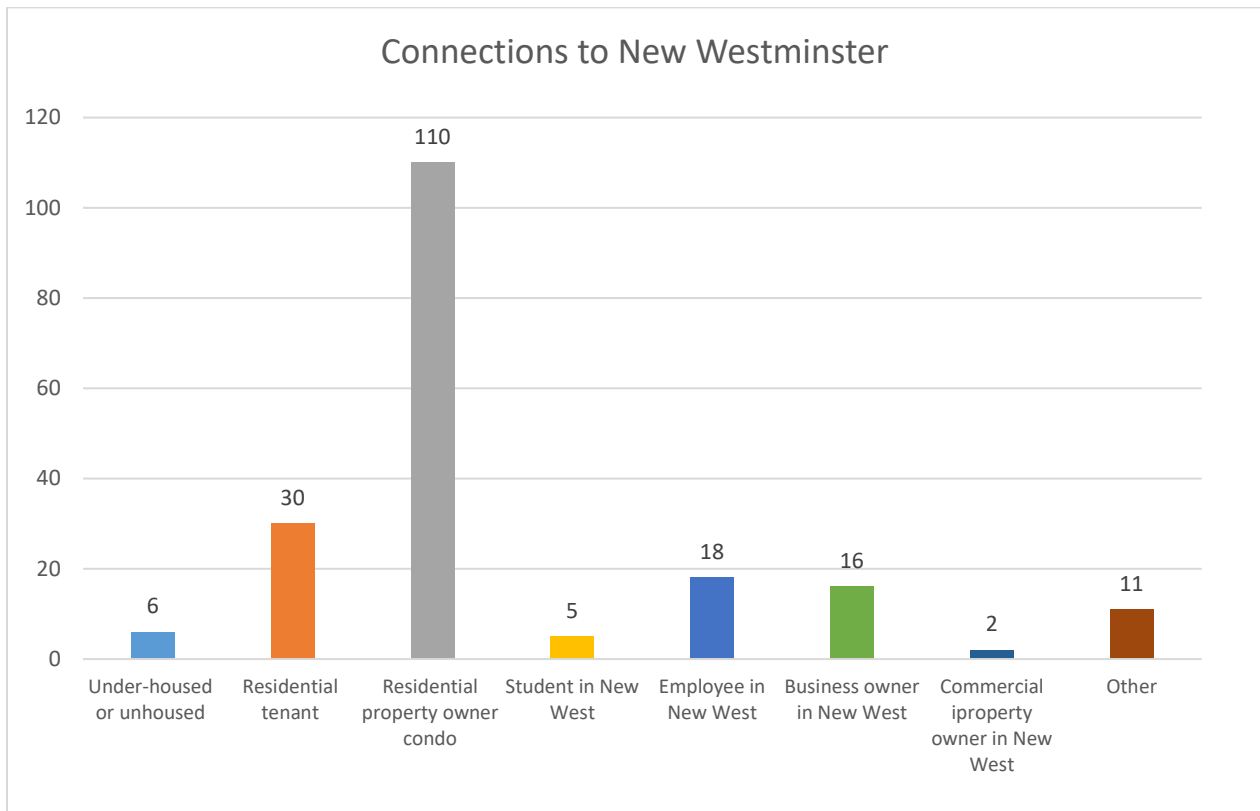

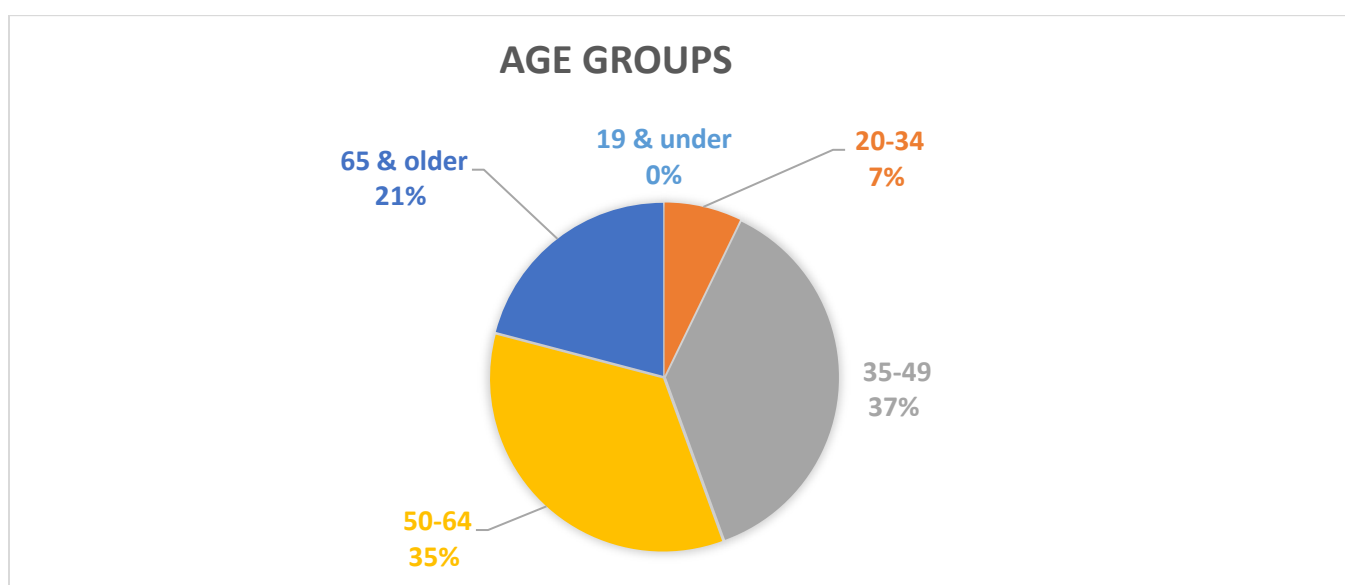

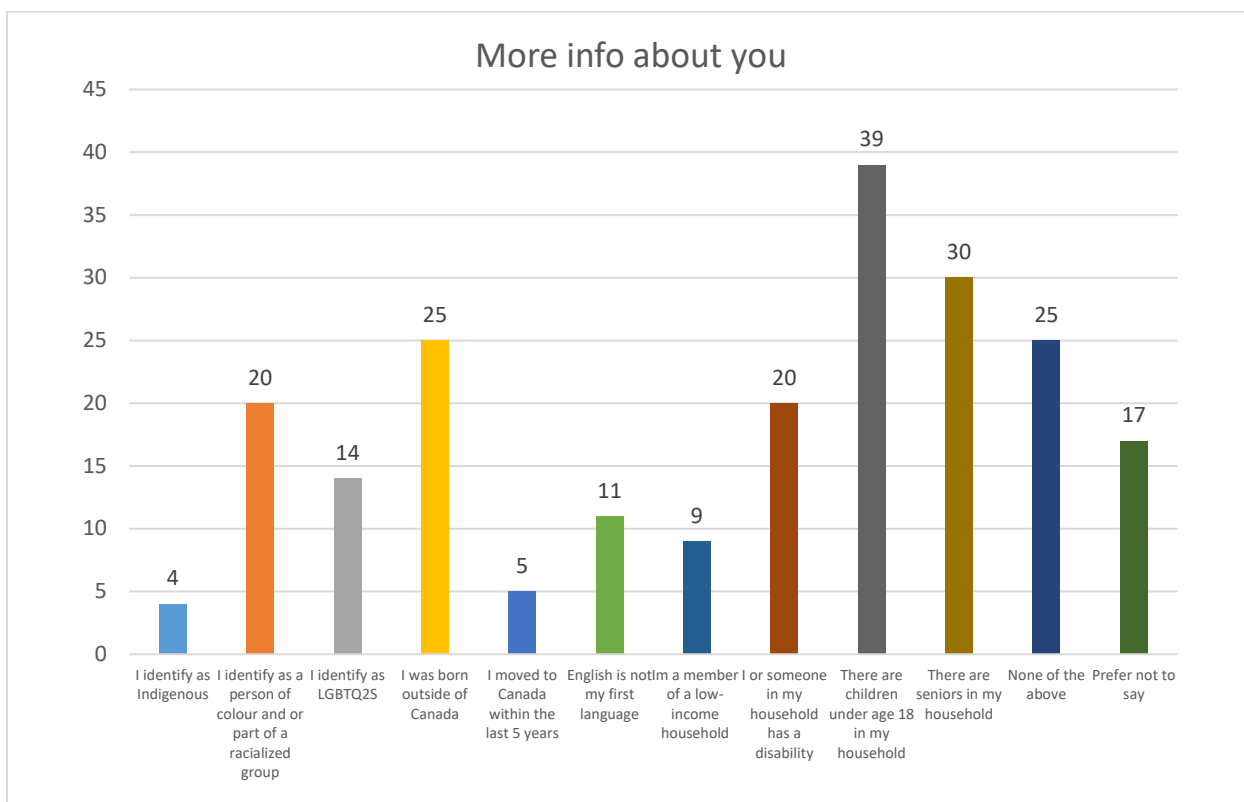

## Demographic Analysis

Demographic analysis has been completed for 153 unique participants who shared input online on Be Heard New West. The characteristics of this group of users were compared to the most recent demographic profile of New Westminster residents from the 2021 Census.

As we see in most City of New Westminster engagements, among online participants, residential property owners were highly over-represented (72% of online participants; 55% of residents according to Census), and tenants were highly under-represented (20% of participants; 45% of residents according to Census). An additional 4% of participants identified as being under-housed or unhoused members of the New West community.

For age ranges of online participants, there were only no online responses from residents age 19 or younger, so this age group was highly under-represented. Ages 20-34 were also highly under-represented compared with 2021 Census data. Conversely, the 35-49 year old, 50-64 year old, and the 65+ age group were overrepresented.

In terms of other demographic information provided by online participants, we can compare with Census data on Indigenous, immigrant, new immigrant (arrived within past five years) and visible minority proportions of the New Westminster community. Based on this comparison, immigrants, visible minorities and newcomers were all highly under-represented amongst Be Heard participants. Indigenous people and parents of children under 18 were similar to 2021 Census representation.

## Next Steps

This engagement summary report will be provided to Council, and shared on the Be Heard New West project page.

City staff are also conducting a municipal scan to gather best practices from other communities. Once these activities are complete, staff will make recommendations to Council for changes to the City's grants program.
