CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

1. CALL TO ORDER IN OPEN SESSION & LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Mayor Johnstone called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and recognized with respect that New Westminster is on the unceded and unsurrendered land of the Halkomelem speaking peoples. He acknowledged that colonialism has made invisible their histories and connections to the land. He recognized that, as a City, we are learning and building relationships with the people whose lands we are on.

2. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

MOVED and SECONDED

THAT Council adopt the September 9, 2024 Regular Council agenda as circulated.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

3. CONSENT AGENDA

MOVED and SECONDED

- 1. **THAT** Council remove Items 3.1, 3.2, 3.3, and 3.5 from the consent agenda; and
- 2. **THAT** Council adopt the recommendations for Items 3.4 and 3.6 to 3.8 by general consent.

3.1 2025 Permissive Property Tax: Exempt Properties - Review of Application Result

In response to queries from Council, Gary So, Senior Manager, Financial Services, advised that two applications were received for exemptions in accordance with provisions of the *Community Charter* for buildings for public worship; four applications were received from not-for-profit organizations and in keeping with the City's practice, staff do not recommend a permissive tax exemption as other avenues are available for these groups to seek financial support including through the City's Community Grant Program.

MOVED and SECONDED

THAT Council give 2025 Permissive Property Tax Exemption Bylaw No. 8474, 2024 (Attachment A) first, second and third readings.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

3.2 Budget 2025: Fees and Rates Review

In response to queries from Council, Lisa Leblanc, Director, Engineering, advised that staff will provide Council a memorandum that details parking rates throughout the city including information on the application currently utilized for payment.

THAT Council grant an exemption from *Construction Noise Bylaw No. 6063*, 1992 to Metro Vancouver's contractor AquaCoustic Remote Technologies Inc. for two weeknights between Tuesday, September 24, 2024 and Thursday, October 24, 2024 from 10:00 PM to 7:00 AM excluding Saturdays, Sundays and statutory holidays to perform overnight video and sonar inspections of the sewer lines at 220 Salter Street.

MOVED and SECONDED

- BE IT RESOLVED THAT staff seek feedback from the public through our Be Heard system regarding their preference for the 2025 Canada Day festivities and celebrations: and
- 2. **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT** several locations across the City be offered to the public as a potential site for the 2025 Canada Day festivities including at least one site in Queensborough.

The question on the motion was not called as discussion took place on the City's current activities for Canada Day, including partnerships with community partners, the potential for a fireworks display, and avenues for public engagement. As a result of the discussion, the following amendment was introduced:

DEFEATED ON A TIED VOTE

The question on the amendment to the main motion was then called and it was **CARRIED** with Cllrs. Fontaine and Minhas opposed.

There was agreement to consider the main motion, as amended, separately.

The question on Part 1 of the main motion, as amended, was then called and it was **CARRIED** with Cllr. Nakagawa opposed.

The question on Part 2 of the main motion was then called and it was **CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY**.

The meeting recessed at 7:10 p.m.	

The meeting reconvened at 7:15 p.m. with all members of Council present, except Cllr. McEvoy.

The regular order of the agenda resumed.

3. OPPORTUNITY FOR THE PUBLIC TO SPEAK TO COUNCIL - 7:00 PM

Christi Arellano spoke in favour of the proposed motion to regulate the unsolicited distribution of graphic images depicting a fetus. C. Arellano urged Council to vote in favour of the proposed motion and introduce a bylaw that would regulate the distribution of such images as the images are harmful, unwanted and unnecessary exposure to graphic images.

Christopher Bell inquired about reGENERATE – a vision for the 22^{nd} Street Neighbourhood as it relates to the legislative process for anticipated land use changes. C. Bell cited concern with the loss of green space and wildlife habitat

once the transformation is underway as well as support for existing residents.

Aggie Black, joined the meeting by electronic means, and spoke in favour of the proposed motion to request that the Lower Mainland Local Government Association begin tracking and reporting how attendees vote on motions and resolutions. A. Black remarked that a voting record would improve transparency by allowing constituents to be informed on how elected officials represent their interests and in particular how each attendee votes on the Union of BC Municipalities' resolution: NR97 – Eliminate Fossil Fuel Funding of SILGA and UBCM.

Maureen Curran echoed A. Black's comments regarding a voting record for resolutions at annual local government conferences and the urged the City to further lead moves against climate change and pollution.

Bereket Kebede spoke to the Queensborough Transportation Plan and required improvements to the Highway 91A / Howes Street Interchange as it relates to pedestrian safety to access public transit.

Kal Bains expressed concern on information exchanged related to a property in the City.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT that staff provide Council with proposed bylaw amendments to require all print collateral delivered to any premises or distributed to the public that shows, or appear to show, a graphic image of a fetus be delivered in a sealed opaque envelope with a graphic content warning, identify the name and address of the sender, and include measures to ensure individuals are not inadvertently exposed to graphic content on a leaflet, pamphlet, paper, booklet, postcard, or any other printed collateral.

The question on the motion was not called as the following amendment was introduced:

MOVED and SECONDED

THAT the following be added as subsequent parts to the main motion:

- 1. AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT staff report back to Council regarding the success rate from other Canadian cities who have imposed a similar bylaw; and
- 2. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT staff report back on the fines and other enforcement measures imposed by other Canadian jurisdictions;

and

- 3. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT staff report back on the anticipated enforcement resources required by city staff to effectively implement and enforce this by-law; and
- 4. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT staff provide a legal opinion to Council regarding the constitutionality of this proposed bylaw.

d. Increasing Openness and Transparency at City Hall by Registering Lobbyist Activities

- a. The Province amend the *Lobbyist Registration Act* to cover the City of New Westminster and other similar mid-to-large-sized cities and administer the regulation of lobbying in the city; OR,
- b. The Province amend the Community Charter to allow the City to establish a lobbyist registry and give the City the legal authority to register lobbyists, create rules for lobbyists' conduct in their interactions with elected officials and public servants, as well as the power to enforce those rules. In addition, the Province further empower the Provincial Registrar of Lobbyists to work with the City to share information so as to reduce duplication and costs for both orders of government.
